There's no limit to the energy and vitality of O'ahu. A fusion of urban excitement and serene country, this modern, vibrant island remains steeped in Native Hawaiian and global history.

■ Lē'ahi —Diamond Head

Centuries ago, Hawaiians named this land mass Lē'ahi (brow of the tuna). Take a hike to the top of this 760-foot extinct volcanic tuff cone and enjoy a panoramic view. Advance reservations are required for out-of-state visitors.

● 'Iolani Palace

Once the official residence of Hawaiian monarchs, take a guided tour of the only royal palace on U.S. soil.

• Pearl Harbor Historic Sites

History comes alive at the four informative and deeply moving museums here: the Pearl Harbor National Memorial and Visitor Center, the Battleship Missouri Memorial, the Pacific Fleet Submarine Museum and the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum. Advance reservations are required.

Bernice PauahiBishop Museum

Founded in 1889, the Bishop Museum showcases Native Hawaiian and Pacific Island culture, history, and a planetarium and Science Adventure Center.

Hānaiakamalama — Queen Emma Summer Palace

Visit the summer retreat of Queen Emma, King Kamehameha IV and their son, Prince Albert. See the many antiques that stand in their original places.

• Nu'uanu Pali State Wayside (Pali Lookout)

3,000 feet above the coastline is the site of the battle of Nu'uanu, where in 1795 King Kamehameha I united O'ahu with the rest of the southern Hawaiian Islands.

Waimea Valley

Meander through 1,800 acres of rainforests and botanical gardens to discover rich culture and history. Nestled within the historic *abupua'a* (traditional land division) system, this valley was once a vibrant Native Hawaiian village.

Chinatown Historic District

One of the oldest Chinatowns in the United States, Honolulu's historic Chinatown is the heart of O'ahu's downtown culinary and art scene. Stroll through open air markets and fragrant *lei* stands, all coexisting with trendy bars and restaurants.

• Hanauma Bay Nature Preserve


Sheltered in the curved bay of a breached volcanic crater, this marine conservatory is famous for its responsible snorkeling. Advanced reservations are required for out-of state visitors. Before admission, the pre-entry video and fee support preservation efforts. Please protect the fragile ecosystem by avoiding stepping on living coral.


Kawaiaha'oChurch

Take a self-guided walking tour of the oldest Christian church on O'ahu, built out of 14,000 coral slabs and dedicated in 1842 at the order of Kuhina Nui Ka'ahumanu.

Duke Paoa Kahanamoku Memorial Statue

Pay tribute to Hawai'i's first Olympian, "the father of modern surfing." On O'ahu, experience surfing by watching the pros ride the North Shore's massive swells or by riding yourself on gentler waves in Waikīkī on the South Shore.
