Approximate Driving Times

From Lānaʻi Airport (LNY) to:

Lānaʻi City	8 min (4 miles)
Mānele Bay	25 min (10 miles)
Kaiolohia	40 min (13 miles)



With miles of backcountry roads and beaches so quiet they seem to belong to you alone, Lānaʻi is the ideal peaceful getaway. Take your time and drive with *aloha*.

● Lānaʻi City

Stroll through shops, art galleries and restaurants, as well as the Lānaʻi Culture and Heritage Center and Lānaʻi Art Center. If visiting on a weekend, stop by the farmers market that's held in the town square every Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon. Hours subject to change.

● Keahiakawelo

Keahiakawelo, which translates to "fire of Kawelo," is a rock garden at the end of Polihua Road. A storied place on the northwest side of the island, its mysterious lunar topography is populated with boulders and rock towers. The area is accessible by hiking or by using four-wheel drive to get to the end of Polihua Road. Please do not move the stones or create rock stacks or cairns.

● Hulopoʻe Bay

With a stunning expanse of golden sand and deep blue waters, this area has a beach park with picnic tables, barbecue grills, restrooms and showers.



Lānaʻi

Most of the year, this protected bay is the best spot on the island for snorkeling, swimming, bodyboarding and exploring the many tide pools carved out of volcanic rock. Since this is a protected site, please leave every stone and shell in its place. This helps to preserve Lānaʻi's beaches and bays for Hawaiʻi's colorful native fish and marine life. In the winter months, swimmers should avoid the rough conditions.

● Kaiolohia

Just off this shore, the massive rusting hulk of a WWII Liberty ship stands marooned on a reef, anchored in time. The eight-mile stretch of shore is a wonderful place to hike and beachcomb, with spectacular viewpoints. Swimming here is not advised.

● Lānaʻi Culture and Heritage Center

Plan a visit to one of the many cultural and historical sites on Lānaʻi through this community-based, 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, which is dedicated to preserving, protecting, and honoring Lānaʻi's rich history, culture and values. Visit its museum at 730 Lānaʻi Ave, Ste 118. Current hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 1–3 p.m. Hours are subject to change. lanaichc.org
